“Paths Untrodden”

Now the Lord said to Abram, “Go from your country and your kindred and your father’s house to the land that I will show you. And I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and him who dishonors you I will curse, and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed.” So, Abram went, as the Lord had told him, and Lot went with him. Abram was seventy-five years old when he departed from Haran. (Genesis 12:1-4, ESV)

Prior to the beginning of Genesis, Chapter 12, Abram is more or less just a name in a genealogy—one of those lists of “begats” that people tend to skip when they read the Bible. There’s nothing in the text to suggest that Abram was especially deserving or especially promising. Other than the names of Abram’s relatives, Genesis doesn’t tell us much about him—except that his wife Sarai was unable to bear children. He shows up in the narrative as a man without a story and without a future. But then, for no humanly discernable reason, God calls Abram and promises him a future, and his story begins. You know that story as the Bible—for you can truthfully say that the Bible is the story of Abram’s family down through the ages, culminating in the arrival in the flesh of God himself, born a descendent of Abram, so that in him all the families of the world might be blessed.

The call of Abram is a wonderful picture of *grace*—God’s undeserved favor. God calls those who have no story and invites them into his story; he calls those who have no future and promises them an eternal future. He calls the unpromising and the undeserving and makes them partners in his blessing-filled purpose. As was the case for Abraham, God’s grace can prove a disruptive thing. His call often plucks us from familiar places and comfortable routines and propels us into adventures we could never have imagined.

As my family and I have prepared for our new adventure in Olney, I have had ample occasion to reflect upon God’s graceful propensity to lead his people down unfamiliar paths to unexpected futures. I have developed a special fondness for a little prayer written by the late Anglican priest and academic Eric Milner-White. A decorated army chaplain who served on the Western Front during the First World War, Milner-White became dean of King’s College, Cambridge, where he introduced the now-famous Service of Nine Lessons and Carols. During the dark early days of World War II, he published this prayer, written as a reflection on the call of Abram:

O Lord God, who hast called thy servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown: Give us faith to go out with a good courage, not knowing whither we go, but only that thy hand is leading us, and thy love supporting us; to the glory of thy Name.

This new chapter of ministry together at Good Shepherd is an untrodden path for all of us. And it’s only natural if we approach it with a mix of hope and trepidation. I don’t know what lies ahead, but I am confident of this: The Lord has called us to this new venture, and we can be sure that he will lead us and support us in the journey ahead.

So let’s go forth with good courage! Because where God leads, blessings will abound—now and to life everlasting.

Hello from the Boergers! Tim, Sophie, Thaddeus, and I are all excited to join the community at Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd. We look forward to getting to know all of you better, but in the meantime, here is a bit of background on us.

Tim and I celebrated our 16th wedding anniversary at the beginning of January. We both did our undergraduate degrees at Rice University in Houston—Tim's B.A. is in English; I have a B.A. in Medieval Studies, a B.Mus in music history, and an M.Mus in musicology. We met through a friend in common a few years after graduation. I was presenting a pre-concert lecture before a symphony concert, and our friend Chris, knowing Tim's love of classical music, asked if he could bring him along. His parents and his two brothers and their families live in San Antonio, and attend St. Paul Lutheran Church, where Tim's dad has served for over four decades as pastor. Tim's sister Laura and her family live in St. Louis and attend Timothy Lutheran Church, where brother-in-law Mark is the Director of Christian Education.

I'm a New Orleans native and still live that out in my love of Louisiana food and music. My family moved to Dallas when I was in middle school; my parents, two sisters and their families still live in the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex. I'm a life-long violinist, and I love performing and arranging music, as well as cooking, gardening, and other crafty things. I'm excited to contribute at LCGS to the already-vibrant music ministry.

Sophie Magdalena joined us in September 2010 and Thaddeus James in January 2014. Sophie is in third grade at Olney Elementary, and loves art and all things My Little Pony. She wants to grow up to be a painter. Thaddeus is at Shepherd's Care and loves hot wheels, Transformers and Doctor Who (as long as it isn't too scary). He wants to be a construction worker when he grows up. Both of them keep us on our toes and provide an endless supply of funny stories.







He didn't commit the crime. Yet he is sitting on death row awaiting execution. The year is 1985 and this 29-year-old black man had been given the death sentence by an all-white jury in Birmingham, Alabama after two hours of jury deliberation. To withstand isolation, Hinton read voraciously. He even ran a book club while in prison. Finally, his case was adopted by a prominent civil rights attorney, Bryan Stephenson. He won his freedom in 2015. Hinton's life is one of inspiration, which he wonderfully relays here in bitingly honest prose. 

Have a Heart

February: the month devoted to love. Stores are filled with heart-shaped boxes of candy and heart-shaped cards and vases of flowers with heart-shaped gift tags. All this is available for the consumer so that he can find the appropriate expression of his devotion to his loved one. If that expression of love has been preceded by a year of thoughtful and loving words and deeds, it is welcomed and cherished by the recipient. If not, it is just an empty ritual, done out of duty rather than true devotion.

Our relationship to the Lord is similar. He, too, desires our sincere devotion, not empty lip service. *“The Lord says: ‘These people come near to Me with their mouth and honor Me with their lips, but their hearts are far from Me’ ”* (Isaiah 29:13).

Stewardship is serving, helping, giving, but love is the basis for stewardship. Without love, our good deeds are empty and without merit. The first act of true stewardship is to *“love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength”* (Deuteronomy 6:5). Jesus called this the most important commandment (Mark 12:29, 30). With that love for the Lord in us, we are enabled to be good stewards. Then we can do acts of good stewardship, acts of true devotion. We are enabled to . . .

- *“Give generously to Him and do so without a grudging heart”* (Deuteronomy 15:10).
- *“Carefully observe [His decrees and laws] with all your heart and with all your soul”* (Deuteronomy 26:16).
- *“Share with God’s people who are in need. Practice hospitality”* (Romans 12:13).

- *“Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men”* (Colossians 3:23).

God, through Ezekiel, promised, *“I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you; I will remove from you your heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh. And I will put My Spirit in you and move you to follow My decrees and be careful to keep My laws”* (Ezekiel 36:26-27). This promise He has fulfilled in His Son, Jesus, who has followed His Father’s decrees and kept His laws for us. As we strive to live fruitful lives of stewardship, at the same time, we rest in Christ Who has been the perfect steward for us.
